sorry for taking so long to respond.

You can find attached some other pictures of the Balilla model. I took two of them when I was child on the balcony of my house of then. I also attach a picture of my dad now. Unfortunately I have no pictures of him with the Balilla.

I will investigate with my father if he has some other pictures of the model. The quality of the scanning is poor. I will get a new scanner soon and so I will be able to have a better quality of the images.

My father took two years (more than less) to make the model. He worked on it in the evening and during the weekend since he was employed as designer in a company during the day. My mother took care of sewing the seats and the other pieces of fabric.

My father still has a lathe he used to make all the round pieces, as the nipples of the wheel radius he made one by one. An uncle of my mother had a chrome workshop. So my father asked him to get a chrome surface finish of all those pieces requiring this surface finish. He drove crazy to work on all those tiny pieces!

The working features of the model are the horn, the lights and the engine fan. These features are managed by a processor ordering the sequence.

There was no oil in the engine so I cannot image how the engine can leak oil. Maybe over the years something get the engine dirty. Or the previous owner made something. My father made nothing to simulate oil leaking.

on the Italian newspaper "La Repubblica" (<u>http://www.repubblica.it/2007/02/motori/febbraio-07/museo-balilla-modellino/museo-balilla-modellino.html?ref=motart</u>, and in the DFW Elite Toy Museum website, as I can see) has appeared an article on the FIAT Balilla Roadster exposed in the DFW Elite Toy Museum.

I recognised the Balilla Coppa Oro (it is its real name) model that my father made many years ago.

He exposed it at the Toys exhibition in Milan and then sold it to Mr. Giansanti, a Swiss car collector.

So I would specify that that car model has not built by Italian engineers but by my father, Mr. Sebastiano Musso, an Italian model maker for hobby.

My father got the Balilla drawings from the "Fiat Archivio Storico" (Fiat Historical Archive). Just a curiosity: the model scale is not ¼ but slightly less. The reason is that he started from the tires he got as promotional gadget (they were used to surround an ash tray) from the CEAT tires manufacturer (you can see the brand stamped on the tires). In fact the tires were the most difficult item to make and so my father decided to use that for making the car model.

My father has still some pictures of "his" Balilla and he is very proud to see that the model he made is now in the United States.
